A beautiful old building saved and given a soul

In 1935 the BNZ Bank Company built a new building at 230 Great North Road in Winton to house their banking chambers and to provide accommodation for the bank manager's family.

The building was designed with the Art Deco style in mind, which was popular at the time. Then during the 1950s additions were made to both sides of the building and the back was extended.

Over the years the main street of Winton has accommodated many small businesses and retail outlets and has been very busy. Cash banking was once done daily and transactions done manually so many people have been over the front steps of the bank.

The bank was sold into private ownership in the 1990s and I purchased the building in 2003. I adore vintage style and the Art Deco era and believe if you own a heritage building it is up to you to maintain and treasure it for the future.

After the Canterbury earthquakes, BNZ required all their New Zealand buildings to meet a new building standard of at least 80 percent. As part of that I was asked to get an

engineers report done on the building.

It was a very stressful time making decisions and sourcing finance to ensure the BNZ would stay in Winton so our town wouldn't lose a business we rely on and end up with another empty building.

It has taken six years to completely strengthen the building to the required percentage. We've achieved it by working with the top tradespeople, gaining consents and trying out new methods for strengthening buildings.

The bank manager's flat upstairs has been refurbished into beautiful Art Deco-themed accommodation. A website is currently being designed and when the New Zealand flag flies on the flag pole it will be live!





I have taken the strengthening and refurbishing on with passion. Many times I could have walked away from it all but I know now this gorgeous old building has been given a soul and will be standing gracefully on our main street for many years to come.

We are all proud of the community we live in and Winton truly is the heart of Southland. We should treasure our town, the people and buildings we have.

I shifted to Winton with my family in 1985 and I cannot imagine living anywhere else.

Peter Wilding, National Fire and Emergency Manager of Fire Investigation and Arson Reduction, is calling on firefighters to help keep their friends and families safe by checking for Samsung top loader washing machines that were recalled in 2013 due to fire risk.

"Samsung has done an exceptional job of finding and sorting out 93% of the 360,000 affected washing machines, however, there are still machines out there that pose a fire risk and we want to get every machine back."

While fortunately no one has been hurt, a number of fires have been caused by the machines.

Samsung has identified the following areas that have returned fewer machines and therefore may be at higher risk: Auckland (South & West), Waikato, Bay of Plenty, Wairarapa Bush, Taranaki, Whanganui, Manawatu, Kapiti, Wellington and the West Coast.

This recall only affects four models of Samsung top loader washing machines manufactured between February 2010 and February 2013. You can easily check the model on the back of the machine. If it matches the model numbers below it's important to report the machine to Samsung.

- SW75V9WIP/XSA
- SW65V9WIP/XSA
- SW70SPWIP/XSA
- SW80SPWIP/XSA

"Older people, people who are flatting, those who are less mobile or those with English as a second language may have missed the various recall messages so we are urging firefighters to check their neighbours, friends, elderly parents and families machines to make sure they keep safe. For those who have a bach, it's worth checking them too," Peter said.
